Joint Combat Camera Center (JCCC):

Coordinates the acquisition, creation, transmission, replication, distribution, storage, and preservation of visual information (VI) created during joint operations.

Combat Camera (COMCAM):

COMCAM is an operational asset designed to assist in shaping the information landscape, and to help commanders understand, visualize, describe and direct their forces by providing high-quality battlefield video and still imagery.

TDY (Temporary Duty):

Duties that are carried out away from a personnel's permanent or designated duty station.

Check Ride:

A practical test which all aircrew must undergo in the United States military to receive an aircraft pilot's or aircrew certification, or a rating for additional flight privileges.

Sorties:

In military aviation, a sortie refers to an aerial combat mission.

Strut:

A pneumatic air-oil hydraulic shock absorber used on the landing gear of the A-10.

Flight:
